He stated that transparency in all its business dealings was the premier concern of the organization. He also expressed his concern about the increasing piracy and the laxity in the professionalism of seafarers at large.


Ms.Renata Ervilha, General

Incidentally, it may be mentioned that Vale Brasil, almost as big as the Bank of America Tower in New York, is scheduled to be at Rio de Janeiro on May 3, tracking data compiled by Bloomberg show. It is the first of a fleet of 19 such vessels that Vale, the world's largest ironore producer, is building to supply China.

Mr.Eivind Holte, Technical Manager, Saga Shipholding (Norway) spoke about his Company and its new acquisitions. The company has agreed with Daewoo Shipbuilding & Marine Engineering Co. Ltd (DSME) in South Korea to build five 55.000 dwt Open Hatch Gantry Craned (OHGC) vessels. The vessels will be delivered between October 2012 and August 2013. SSH has also ordered two 55.000 dwt OHGC vessels with Oshima Shipbuilding Co. Ltd, Japan, for delivery in 2012 and 2013 respectively. Mr. Holte expressed his satisfaction over Anglo-Eastern being its ship manager.

Capt.Pradeep Chawla, Managing Director, QA & Training, AESM-Hongkong, gave a detailed report on the performance of AESM during




Assurance Superintendent, BP Shipping Ltd., spoke about the effects that complacency had on vetting inspections.

The seminar was followed, later in the evening, by cocktails and dinner for the owners, AESM office bearers and seafarers, dignitaries from the shipping world, along with their families.




## Ship owners and delegates have a conducted 'tour de force' of Anglo Eastern Maritime Training Centre



made to train the engineers in the field of automation and control system. The training model could simulate numerous control systems used onboard vessels. When the engines run the cooling water temperatures must be controlled accurately to avoid cylinder liner failures. Boilers, COP's or purifiers are all subject to the same type of process control which needs good understanding to even recognize the signs of failure or a drop in performance. This training equipment was made to simulate onboard conditions. Mr. Akkara stated that trouble-shooting and fault finding skills could be improved with the integration of theoretical and practical training carried out at AEMTC.

Mr. Roger Tupper, the Director Marine Hong Kong proudly dedicated the Advanced Instrumentation Trainer to maritime training world. He stated that such training equipments were necessary to create onboard situations and control processes to educate the engineers in the field of trouble shooting and fault finding. "We have to move with technology. Anglo Eastern is a leading example to show the other ship management training does not come second to to their sea staff.
