
brain storming session on AEMA set the ball rolling for the inspection of the Academic Block, exhibiting the Wheelhouse, Bridge Handling

> The formal inauguration of the ceremony started in the general auditorium, where Principal Capt. Pawan Gupta, presented a






A welcome break-out from the monotony was provided by Cadet








Akash, who presented a wonderful song in Hindi that was cheered widely by the cadets and guest alike. The Vice-Principal and HOD




opportunities of c a r e e r development with the parent organization. Passion and a fire in the belly should be the motto of all cadets who should leave no stone unturned to improve their
